

1. Grants to Local Educational Agencies (ESEA I-A)



2. Impact Aid Basic Support Payments (ESEA VIII, 8003(b))





4. Educational Technology State Grants (ESEA II-D-1 and 2)



5. State Grants for Innovative Programs (ESEA V Part A)



6. Rural Education (ESEA VI-B)





7. Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities (ESEA IV-A-1)





9. Special Education Grants to States (IDEA Part B)



10. Vocational Education State Grants (VTEA Title I)



11. Federal Pell Grants (HEA IV-A-1)





